- IACCP can play a pivotal role in bridging the gap between psychological research and real-world applications by fostering translational research that informs practice and policymaking. By translating complex psychological findings into actionable insights, the IACCP could equip practitioners, policymakers, and community leaders with evidence-based tools to address global and local challenges. Whether it's guiding intercultural competence in education, shaping equitable mental health interventions, preventing intercultural conflicts, or influencing policies that promote diversity and inclusion, the IACCP should serve as a hub for culturally informed, interdisciplinary knowledge exchange. Through its global network of scholars and practitioners, the Association must ensure that research is not only scientifically rigorous but also contextually relevant, empowering stakeholders to make informed decisions that benefit communities worldwide.
- Most cross-cultural psychology scholarship focuses on country-level differences in psychological phenomena. Going beyond cross-cultural differences, the IACCP is uniquely positioned to lead research on cross-cultural interfaces/encounters and culture change processes, offering critical insights into the dynamic interactions between cultural groups in an increasingly interconnected world. By exploring how individuals and communities negotiate cultural boundaries, adapt to global influences, and maintain cultural identities, the IACCP can illuminate pathways for fostering harmony and resilience in multicultural contexts. This includes examining acculturation, intercultural competence, and the psychological impacts of globalization, migration, and technological advances. As cultural change processes unfold rapidly in the face of global challenges, such as climate crises and shifting political landscapes, the IACCP's research can provide evidence-based guidance for managing these transitions ethically and inclusively.

- IACCP can be crucial in inspiring and attracting the next generation of cross-cultural psychologists by fostering an inclusive, dynamic, and reciprocal learning environment. Mentorship from seasoned scholars provides young researchers with invaluable guidance, wisdom, and access to a global network of expertise. However, to remain relevant and forward-thinking, the IACCP must also embrace reverse mentoring, where doctoral researchers and early-career scholars share fresh perspectives, innovative methodologies, and insights into emerging global challenges. By promoting dialogue between generations, the IACCP can create a collaborative ecosystem that values diverse contributions and adapts to the evolving needs of the field. Initiatives such as interactive workshops, cross-generational research projects, and leadership development opportunities can empower young psychologists to see themselves as integral to the future of cross-cultural psychology, ensuring the Association's sustained growth and impact.
- The IACCP has a vital role in advancing research that highlights cross-cultural similarities, emphasizing the shared psychological processes and values that unite humanity. While recognizing and respecting cultural differences is essential, exploring commonalities can foster collaborative models to tackle major global challenges. By shifting some of its focus to what connects us across cultures, the IACCP can contribute to a narrative that balances diversity with unity, promoting collaborative solutions to global challenges. This approach enriches cross-cultural psychology and underscores the potential for collective action in addressing issues like climate change, social justice, and mental health on a global scale. Another recent book I enjoyed reading was by Fathali Moghaddam (2024) where the author explored the concept of omniculturalism and its potential to unite humanity by emphasizing human similarities rather than differences.

• IACCP must find ways to amplify the number, voice, and influence of members from the majority world—countries often categorized as developing, low-income, or part of the Global South. Historically, our membership base has shown the highest representation from Euro-American regions. By examining IACCP's demographics through an interdisciplinary lens—drawing on the works of Weber, Mills, Foucault, Noelle-Neumann, and Gramsci—we can delve into various concepts of majority, including power majority, perceived majority, silent majority, and cultural majority, and their unique experiences. What is the organizational culture of IACCP, and what does inclusivity truly mean for our association? These are the fresh questions we must explore to better understand our well-established organization.

- We must avoid two common pitfalls in cross-cultural research: (1) equating culture with country (a country is one unit of analysis for culture, but not the unit of analysis), and (2) reducing culture to a single numerical value. Statements like "Country X scored 3.56, while Country Y scored 3.22 on collectivism" illustrate these fallacies. Even when supported by sophisticated statistical methods—such as measurement invariance or item response theory—or large datasets involving many countries, such statements remain problematic. Numbers do not inherently convey the rich, nuanced meanings and lived experiences known only to the participants of our research. Qualitative methods deserve as much respect and appreciation as advanced statistical techniques, such as measurement equivalence, structural equation modeling (SEM), or multilevel analyses. Emerging cross-cultural scholars should be encouraged to adopt mixed-methods approaches, which are essential for capturing the complexity of systems like culture and cross-cultural interactions.
- We also need to better integrate indigenous perspectives into our scholarship to foster a truly global and representative psychological science. Indigenous knowledge systems offer unique insights into human behavior, relationships, and well-being that challenge and enrich mainstream theories. By embracing Indigenous methodologies—such as participatory, relational, and community-based approaches—we honor the epistemologies and lived experiences of diverse cultural groups. For the IACCP, encouraging and representing Indigenous perspectives is not only a matter of equity but also a means of broadening the scope of our research to include voices and wisdom that have historically been marginalized. This integration will strengthen our commitment to cultural diversity, deepen our understanding of global psychological processes, and reinforce the relevance of our work in addressing pressing local and global challenges. Furthermore, we can promote cross-indigenous psychology (Pe-Pua, 2020) that integrates and compares psychological theories, practices, and knowledge from various indigenous cultures to understand human behavior and mental processes through the lens of multiple indigenous perspectives, acknowledging the unique contexts, values, and beliefs that shape these experiences. An excellent example of this effort is Anand Paranjpe's most recent book (2023) I read on Yoga Psychology, where the author tackled a highly complex knowledge system and connected it to mainstream Psychology theories.

The future of IACCP is ours to shape. Let us work together to build an Association that is impactful, inspiring, and inclusive. By fostering research that addresses real-world challenges, inspiring the next generation of cross-cultural psychologists, and embracing diverse voices and perspectives, we can ensure that IACCP continues to thrive as a global leader. Together, we can shape an IACCP that not only advances knowledge but also brings us closer as a community—one that truly reflects the richness and complexity of the world we study.

Memories of Dr. Josephine (Josie) Cecilia Naidoo

How does one truly encapsulate the lives of people who, upon passing, leave behind so much good? I first met Josie in 1994 as she stepped up to assume the crucial position of Secretary-General when the elected incumbent was suddenly unable to continue. During her two-year term, we worked closely together as we developed new communication functions for the Association, such as the website and the new magazine-style Bulletin. I look back, fondly, as I recall what an absolute pleasure is it was to work with Josie. She was warm and conscientious, with unfaltering sincerity.

As the years passed, she was often accompanied to IACCP conferences by her son, Dr. Kenneth Leslie. The last time I saw Josie and Ken was at the 2018 Guelph, Canada Congress. I was conducting interviews with some of the IACCP founders, and despite her declining health, she agreed to be interviewed. It was a bittersweet encounter, knowing it would probably be our last.

Professor Pat Dudgeon

<u>University of Western Australia Profile</u>

Pat Dudgeon is from the Bardi people in Western Australia. She is a psychologist and professor at the Poche Centre for Aboriginal Health and the School of Indigenous Studies at UWA. Her area of research includes Indigenous social and emotional wellbeing and suicide prevention.

Professor Dudgeon is the director of the Centre of Best Practice in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Suicide Prevention at UWA. She is also the lead chief investigator of a national research project, Transforming Indigenous Mental Health and Wellbeing that aims to develop approaches to Indigenous mental health services that promote cultural values and strengths as well as empowering users. She is a board member of Gayaa Dhuwi (Proud Spirit) Australia, and a prominent contributor to the Australian Indigenous Psychologists Association. She was a Commissioner with the National Mental Health Commission and also was the co-chair of the National Ministerial Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mental Health and Suicide Prevention Advisory Group where significant policies had been developed to improve the mental health and wellbeing of Indigenous Australians. She is a current member of Advisory Group to the National Office of Suicide Prevention.

Professor Dudgeon has many publications in Indigenous mental health, in particular, the Working Together Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mental Health and Wellbeing Principals and Practice 2014. Also of note, is the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Suicide Prevention Evaluation Project (ATSISPEP). This ground-breaking evaluation clearly identified the key elements for best practice suicide prevention programs and strategies, and the central importance of Indigenous leadership at all levels of delivery.

Professor Dudgeon was appointed a member (AM) in the General Division of the Order of Australia in 2023.

Professor Mohan J Dutta

Massey University Profile

Mohan J Dutta is Dean's Chair Professor of Communication. He is the Director of the Center for Culture-Centered Approach to Research and Evaluation (CARE) at Massey University. developing culturally-centered, community-based projects of social change, advocacy, and activism that articulate health as a human right. Mohan Dutta's research examines the role of advocacy and activism in challenging marginalizing structures, the relationship between poverty and health, political economy of global health policies, the mobilization of cultural tropes for the justification of neocolonial health development projects, and the ways in which participatory culture-centered processes and strategies of radical democracy serve as axes of global social change.



Professor Matthew Hornsey

<u>UQ Profile</u>

Matthew has published over 200 papers, mostly on how to create change in trust-sensitive, polarised environments. He has conducted cross-national and cross-cultural research on topics such as climate scepticism, vaccine hesitancy, conspiracy theorising, and misinformation about renewable energy.

Matthew is currently leading the Net Zero Observatory at the University of Queensland, a multi-disciplinary group of academics and practitioners who design strategies to accelerate industry action and community support for rapid decarbonisation globally. His most recent research focuses on the capacity of Gen-AI tools such as ChatGPT to reduce misinformation and conspiracy theories about climate mitigation efforts.



Call for Instructors!


Overview

The pre-conference training, sponsored by the International Academy for Intercultural Research (IAIR) and the International Association for Cross-Cultural Psychology (IACCP), is open to PhD and Master level students who are interested in the intersection of culture and psychology.

The pre-conference training provides a research-intensive and interactive experience for participants from various universities to learn from one another and to receive specialized training from experts in different fields that incorporate culture in their study of psychology.

The pre-conference training precedes the IAIR & IACCP joint conference, June 28th – July 1st 2025 in Brisbane, Australia. https://www.intercultural-academy.net/iair-iaccp2025

IAIR & IACCP pre-conference training focuses on community engaged scholarship and supports the development of broad research skills, international collaborations, effective grant proposal writing, and preparation of scholarly manuscripts. Our goal is to stimulate networking and interactions with peers and instructors in a safe and productive environment. We also aim to emphasize the importance of the applied character of research and the necessity of interdisciplinary collaboration.





The program

Students will be able to choose two content streams from potentially 3 streams. Please note that all streams will be in-person. Instructors are asked to prepare 1 day (8 hours) of content that will have to be taught twice.

Instructors are encouraged to submit proposals to the following stream area. Please note these are some examples of the streams that the Organizing Committee has developed (modifications are welcomed).

Stream 1: Methodological and Research Design

Focus A: Quantitative Approaches

- Core principles for ensuring validity and reliability in comparative research, including sampling strategies and measurement equivalence.
- Techniques for addressing cultural bias, back-translation methods, and adapting instruments for cross-cultural contexts.

Focus B: Qualitative Approaches

- Thematic analysis, narrative inquiry, ethnography, and discourse analysis with applications to intercultural contexts.
- Digital ethnography and the role of researcher identity, positionality, and power dynamics in cross-cultural research.


Focus A: Systems Thinking and Participatory Methods

- The interconnectedness of cultural, social, and ecological systems as a foundation for more holistic approaches to understanding intercultural dvnamics.
- Examining intercultural issues through participatory methods that enhance community voices and lived experiences.

Stream 2: Rethinking Research and **Meta-Science**

Focus B: Open Science and Meta-Research

- Strategies to improve reproducibility and apply open science principles (e.g., pre-registration, data sharing, and open-access publishing) in crosscultural research.
- Meta-scientific methods such as systematic reviews and meta-analysis.





Stream 3: Skills Development Workshops

Focus A: Grant Writing and Career Pathways

- Competitive proposals for cross-cultural and intercultural research funding.
- Pathways for PhD students in academia, industry, NGOs, and policymaking with a focus on cross-cultural applications.

Focus B: Writing, Ethics, and Synthesis

- Develop skills for writing for non-academic audiences, such as blogs, opinion pieces, or public reports.
- Techniques for combining findings from different cultures using metaanalysis and systematic reviews, including addressing challenges in cultural variability.

Timeline: February 20th, 2025 – Deadline for Instructor applications

Benefits: Instructors will receive compensation: \$400 USD payment, plus two days of accommodation, breakfast, and lunch.

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
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This reflects an increasing trend in the publishing world and among scientific associations like IACCP to promote environmental and financial sustainability.
